
Intravenous (IV) Catheter and Fluid Therapy: An IV catheter allows us to give injectable drugs for immediate effect in cases of emergencies. IV fluids help us maintain proper body temperature and blood pressure which is vital for protecting the internal organs. Both the catheter and fluids dramatically increase the safety of the anesthesia.

Dental Radiographs: Many dental disease conditions cannot be properly diagnosed or treated without taking radiographs of the tooth roots. Having dental radiographs allows us to make informed decisions about tooth treatment options.

Performing dental radiographs allows veterinarians to see below the surface for tooth decay and fractures, abscesses and infections, impacted or retained teeth, periodontal disease and oral tumors.

During the procedure, your veterinarian will position a dental X-ray sensor inside your dog's mouth to capture the images. Multiple images may be taken from different angles to provide a complete view of your dog's oral structures. Once the images are obtained, your veterinarian will analyze them to assess your dog's dental health and identify any potential issues. They will discuss the findings with you and recommend appropriate treatment options if necessary.

Cats Corner




